

Message from the Head Teacher:

We're now into the full swing or our new academic year and I would like to congratulate all our years for returning to the Academy with a smile on their faces and a positive attitude to learning. I'd like to say a special welcome to our new Year 7's who have really shown that they are truly a part of Noel-Baker and have welcomed every challenge that has faced them head on – they are amazing.

A couple of things that I need to inform you of and also need to ask for your assistance with:

Lockdown Drill

Firstly, as part of our safeguarding practises and procedures, we have to practise should the Academy need to be placed into lockdown. This drill will happen at some point over the next few weeks. A real lockdown would happen if students and staff need to be locked within buildings for their own safety. This could be if there is a dangerous intruder on the Academy's grounds, but more likely, it would occur in the event of a hazardous situation such as a chemical spill or fire outside of the Academy, which makes it dangerous for students, staff and visitors to be outside.

Please do not become alarmed, it something we have to do should the occasion arise.

Allergies

We have two students who have joined our academy this term who have a severe allergy to nuts. The allergy is so severe that even opening anything that contains nuts near them can cause a reaction. Due to this please can we kindly ask that no item of food is brought into the academy which may contain nuts or is a nut i.e. breakfast cereal bars, snickers, a packet of nuts in pace of a packet of crisps etc. I really cannot stress the severity of the allergy these students have, we have already had an incident where paramedics needed to be called due to an item with nuts in being opened.

Your cooperation and assistance with this is greatly appreciated.

Quality of Education:

We have been delighted to welcome our students back to school for the new academic year, and this term has got off to a flying start. The Noel-Baker day comprises 330 minutes of learning time, and we like to make sure that we start our day's learning as effectively as possible. In Years 7-10, students' days begin with a session of daily reading, during which students are read to from a diverse, challenging, poignant and enriching selection of novels. Across the four years, students will find themselves journeying, through these books, across time and space, exploring both their own world and also worlds beyond their own experience. In Year 11, meanwhile, we are excited to have launched our new initiative to begin the day - NBA Review. Knowing how vital it is to revise little and often, these powerful daily sessions support students to embed knowledge from the core subjects of English, Maths and Science into their long-term memory. Year 11 are already making great use of these morning lessons, and we are really proud of their strong and determined approach to this new term.



Attendance Matters:

To all our lovely new year 7's and new starters- welcome to Noel- Baker and welcome back to all our other wonderful year groups! We are excited to see your child maintain an excellent attendance record so they have full access to a knowledge rich curriculum, the opportunity to engage positively with the academy and be able to enjoy a feeling of belonging to their community. Many parents question what a good attendance record looks like. Of course your child must aim for an attendance record of 100% but what will your child's attendance record be if they are absent? To enable you to understand the impact of your child missing their learning we have created a simple table below:

To ensure that your child 'hits' the green, they must only have a maximum of 4 absences this year. We know that the main reason your child may be absent from school is due to illness. Keeping healthy, so your child is able to attend school regularly, is an important part of your child's life. You can help them by ensuring that they exercise, get enough sleep and eat a healthy diet. Please remember that early morning aches and pains often pass, so don't keep your child at home 'just in case', when they could be learning. Safeguarding:

As part of our youth engagement, the **Derbyshire Youth Commission** have developed four easy to access surveys on their chosen priorities:

- Knife and Gang Crime
- Abuse and Sexual Harassment
- Relationships between Young People and the Police
- Drugs and Alcohol Abuse

The survey's aim to:

- Understand young people's lived experiences of policing and crime
- Understand the challenges young people face when accessing and finding services
- Involve young people in developing future solutions

The surveys are open to young people aged 14-25 years who live in Derby or Derbyshire.

The survey's results will form part of wider research from the youth commissions peer to peer workshops on the priorities. All the results collected will be used to create recommendations for change which will be presented to the **Police and Crime Commissioner Angelique Foster, Chief Constable Rachel Swann and wider stakeholders.** We'd be grateful for your support in sharing these survey's with young people.

Behaviour:

Firstly can we say a big thank you to all the students for their positive attitude in returning to the Academy after the summer break. SLANT, SHAPE and STEPS are being followed which is only enforcing the positivity within the Academy which is amazing.

Secondly, please can we reiterate the following with regards to uniform:

- Lanyards are required to be worn at all times this is not optional. Should a student misplace theirs they must contact their Head of House to obtain a new one;
- Piercing Only one pair of stud earrings are to be worn. Nose piercings, Tragus, Helix etc. are not
 permitted and must be removed during Academy hours, this includes plastic retainers;
