We know that errors are a part of the learning process, and we rule these through with a single line. All improvements and developments are completed in green pen.

We write in **SENTENCES**.

We write, whenever instructed to by our teachers, in full sentences. If full sentences are not appropriate to the task, our teacher will inform us of this and model the appropriate format for our writing.

E

We use the right **EQUIPMENT** for the task.

We write in black ink, and draw using pencil. All improvements and developments are completed in green pen.

N

We **NEVER** deface our books.

We write in black ink, and draw using pencil. All improvements and developments are completed in green pen.

T

We **TRY** our best in all of the work that we complete.

We always give 100% to our work, knowing that with persistent effort and patience, amazing things can be achieved.

Our high standards and expectations

Noel-Baker Academy operates a culture built upon mutual respect. Everything we do links directly to our core principles of Leadership, Empowerment, Achievement and Drive. At Noel-Baker we are always polite and courteous. We say 'Sir' and 'Miss' to all staff. We say 'please' and 'thank you' and 'excuse me'. Uniform

Compulsory Academy Uniform, which comprises:

- ✓ Academy pass and lanyard (provided by the Academy) to be worn at all times.
- ✓ Grey school blazer with school badge.
- ✓ Plain white shirt with a collar.
- ✓ Plain black tailored trousers or NBA school skirt.
- ✓ Kameez – Plain black knee-length dress. Must be worn with school blazer. Navy v-neck jumper can be worn as an addition, as described above.
- ✓ Shalwar – Plain black narrow tapered trousers or school trousers, as described above.
- ✓ Abaya/Jilbab – Plain 'A line' or straight design in black with no embellishments. Must be worn with school blazer. Navy v-neck jumper can be worn as an addition, as described above.
- ✓ Clip-on school tie – all students unless wearing Kameez / Abaya /Jilbab.
- ✓ Tights or socks in black, white, blue or grey.
- ✓ Sensible leather-look shoes - black only. NO LOGOS. No boots or trainers of any description.
- ✓ One pair of stud earrings in the lobe.
- ✓ Head scarfs/turbans can be worn for students of religious cultures - black, white, burgundy, navy blue or brown can be worn. Bright colours are not acceptable other than time linked to religious festivals.

At Noel-Baker Academy, we have high expectations of our students' uniform and presentation.

At Noel-Baker Academy, we pride ourselves on high standards and expectations and believe it is essential that this is reflected in our appearance as we go about our studies.

Our school community is diverse, and time has been taken to ensure we are fully inclusive and we embrace all cultures.

We expect students to wear our uniform with a sense of pride and purpose. This will reduce bullying and stereotyping by removing expensive branded items and demonstrates an ethos signifying a community and belonging.

Noel-Baker students wear their uniform with pride and know that they represent the Academy both in and outside of the Academy.


NB - Any students not wearing the correct uniform, for example, footwear, will be expected to borrow a pair of shoes from the Academy - the shoes will be treated with a hygienic spray after each use.

Failure to wear the shoes provided will result in an internal exclusion (refusing a reasonable request).



Optional Academy uniform:

- Navy blue V neck jumper – sleeves need to be at full length.
- Outdoor coats are allowed on in the academy building, but must be removed in the lessons. Hooded tops (unless the NBA hooded top) or denim jackets are not appropriate and will be confiscated if seen.



Uniform

Students are **NOT** allowed to wear:

- Hooded tops of the type often referred to as 'hoodies,' unless NBA hooded top.
- Trousers with very tight-fitting legs, jeans, leggings, jeggings, jogging bottoms, tracksuits, pinstripe or cords.
- Skirts that are not the NBA school skirt.
- Any facial piercings (nose studs, tongue-bars, or piercings in any other part of the ear than the lobe). Exceptions will be made for religious/cultural purposes. This will be agreed with the Academy. For example, in Physical Education, these will be removed during practical situations.
- Hair colour that is not natural.
- Their Noel-Baker hooded top on non-PE days, unless instructed by SLT during winter months.

Compulsory PE Uniform

All students are expected to arrive in their PE kit on days when they have PE. This is still true even if they are not physically able to do PE that day. All kit must be marked with the student's name and tutor group. Jewellery must not be worn during PE lessons as it poses a health and safety risk and can be lost or damaged.

- ✓ Academy polo top or plain navy round neck t-shirt.
- ✓ Plain navy-blue shorts.
- ✓ Plain navy-blue knee-length games socks. For use when shin-pads are being worn.
- ✓ Indoor trainers - Non-marking sole with laces, providing support to ankle & foot.
- ✓ Outdoor trainers - Good grip with laces supporting the ankle & foot. NB - Pumps do not provide adequate support for the foot or ankle.
- ✓ Gum shield - for rugby/hockey.
- ✓ Shin pads - for football/hockey.
- ✓ Base layers/skins are allowed for religious/cultural reasons that require students to cover up.

Optional PE Uniform

- ✓ Academy reversible games top.
- ✓ Base layers/skins are optional for all students in cold weather.
- ✓ NBA hooded top.
- ✓ Navy NBA waterproof PE jacket or non-branded navy alternative.

Jewellery, make-up and hair styles:

Students may wear a watch, one ring and up to one pair of small ear studs (one stud by ear lobe).

No other jewellery is permitted; if students have any other visible piercings or retainers, these must be removed during the school day. Failure to do so will result in the Academy contacting the parents/carers to resolve the issue. We may also send students home to change to rectify any problems or isolate students if their uniform is not appropriate or does not adhere to our uniform policy. Jewellery over-and-above this (e.g. necklaces and bracelets) will be confiscated.

Students may wear a small amount of discreet make-up in natural colours, but the Academy may ask students to remove any make-up staff consider inappropriate.

False nails are allowed within the Academy, but they must be less than 5mm over the nail to be an appropriate length due to health and safety reasons.

Any hair accessories should be small and plain coloured only. Shaved emblems or lines, unnatural colour dyes are not allowed. Hair-extensions/braids of natural colour are deemed acceptable.

If you are unsure whether a hairstyle or piercing meets our uniform guide, please contact Mrs Chrissie Sargent, Assistant Headteacher, for guidance before any treatment.

NB. The Head teacher's decision is final and binding.

House lanyards:

House lanyards are to be worn by all students around the academy. The lanyards represent the house colours as shown and are provided by the Academy.



Equipment

In addition to the Academy uniform, PE kit and appropriate school bag (large enough to fit A4 books and all equipment for the day, including PE kit when required), pupils will require the following equipment to support their studies. Equipment will be checked every morning by the form tutor, and failure to bring equipment to school will result in a sanction being issued.

We believe that it is essential that students at Noel-Baker Academy learn to be responsible and organised to prepare them for life beyond school.

Your child will need to bring to the Academy:

- ✓ At least two pens (blue or black)
- ✓ A green pen (used for development and improvement work)
- ✓ At least two pencils
- ✓ Highlighter
- ✓ A maths set
- ✓ A 30cm ruler
- ✓ A rubber
- ✓ A pencil case
- ✓ A scientific calculator
- ✓ Any exercise books/homework needed for the lesson



Mobile Phones and other portable devices

Students' mobile phones are NOT allowed in the Academy Building. Should these be seen by a member of staff, they will be kept in the Academy safe until the end of the day, and parents are required to collect them.

Students are encouraged NOT to bring pagers, iPods, iPads or other MP3/4 players or equivalent devices to the Academy. The Academy will not accept any responsibility for such items if brought to the Academy regarding loss, theft or damage. They will NOT be 'looked after' by staff under any circumstances, including PE. If these items are brought to the Academy, they will be entirely and totally at the pupil's own risk, and they must be kept in coats and bags.

If brought to the Academy, they must NOT be switched on in lessons.

Students who abuse this policy and use their device in lessons will have it confiscated. It will be returned to students on the 'first offence', but repeated instances will require parents to collect the item from the Academy.

Students taking public examinations (actual or mock) must not take any communication device into the examination room under any circumstances.

Items students must NOT bring to the Academy.

Your child MUST NOT bring dangerous items to the Academy for health and safety reasons, including matches, lighters, cigarettes, penknives, and vapes. Any such items will be confiscated.

Lost Property

Anything found should always be handed into Reception. If your child loses something, they will be encouraged to try to remember where they last had the item and check at the place where they were last. If they still cannot find the item, they will be taken to reception and asked if it has been handed in.

Ensure that all belongings have your child's name in them. If they lose an Academy book, they will be expected to pay for a new one.

Any student who fails to comply with this policy will be operating against the Academy's code of conduct and will be sanctioned accordingly.

Contact with the Academy

Please ensure that the Academy has up-to-date contact details for use in an emergency and to ensure that we can keep in touch to support your child.

You can access information about your child's progress, attendance, behaviour and timetable using our online platform 'Go 4 Schools'. Parents and students will be provided with login information during the first week of term.

During the year, you will have opportunities to meet with staff at our Parents' Evenings.

If your child is involved in an incident or we have a concern, we will endeavour to contact you as soon as possible. Where necessary, we will arrange an appointment for you to come into the Academy to agree on the best way forward.

You will receive newsletters and other mailings to keep you informed about general developments and events in the Academy. Our website, **www.noelbakeracademy.co.uk** is regularly updated to keep all members of the Academy community and visitors informed. We also use a texting service to alert parents regarding emergency Academy closures, parents' evenings and when reports are due to go home.

We regularly update Facebook and Twitter with Academy information.

Contacting your child

In an emergency where you need to contact your child during the day, please phone and leave a message with reception. If your child needs to contact you, they should go to their Head of House. Due to mobile phones not being allowed in the Academy, you/your child should not contact each other via mobile phones.

Contacting the Academy

The first point of contact for both you and your child is your child's form tutor. This is the person who knows your child best at the Academy and will be in the best position to help. If they need to, they will refer the matter to their Head of House.

If your child has a problem or concern, encourage them to speak to their tutor in confidence. Their tutor will discuss any action needed with your child and keep you informed as necessary.

You can contact your child's tutor by telephone, email or letter. Please be aware that your child's tutor may have a full teaching day and may not be able to speak to you immediately. We endeavour to return telephone calls within 48 hours.

If you have a more complicated matter to discuss, we encourage you to make an appointment with the Head of House.

Please telephone or email to arrange an appointment if you must speak to someone immediately.

Lunchtime Arrangements

Pupils have two options for lunch:

1. Buy a hot meal

2. Bring sandwiches

Pupils will eat their lunch in the Academy cafeteria, either a hot meal or sandwiches. Academy meals operate on a cafeteria system, and there is a selection of food available, which is pre-paid using the Academy's cashless system. There is a meal deal option for £2.70, including a dish-of-the-day, a drink and a biscuit/cake, or, pupils can pay for individual items they choose. Your child will be shown exactly what to do on the first day. When your child has finished eating, they will be expected to take their rubbish to the bins. No food may be taken out of the cafeteria.

Children will be issued with an Academy Pass and a House lanyard which they must wear whilst in the Academy. They will use this Academy Pass to buy items from the cafeteria. They should not lend to anyone else and, if lost, must report to their Head of House so that it can be cancelled and a new Academy Pass issued. Children should only queue once for items at lunchtime to avoid the build-up of long queues.

Pupils who are entitled to free meals receive a meal at lunchtime for up to £2.70 per day. If you are in receipt of benefits you may be eligible for Free School Meals. You can find out by checking here:

If your child's account inadvertently runs out of money, they must report to their Head of House for their year, who will write them a note allowing them to have a meal up to £2.70.

Names and forms of people borrowing will be recorded, and they will be expected to pay the money back on the following day. However, your child should make every effort to ensure that they have money in their account.

No pupils will be allowed off the Academy site at lunchtime unless they have been signed out for an appointment that has been authorised by the Pastoral Lead. Please emphasise to your child the importance of polite, helpful behaviour at lunchtime. Students who fail to be cooperative at lunchtime or cause problems for the dinner staff may be excluded from the Academy at lunchtime.



Schoolgateway

Noel-Baker is a cashless school. You can pay for school dinners, trips, resources, prom tickets and other items using the School Gateway app. Any money added using the school gateway app for dinners will be taken off when your child uses their Academy Pass at lunch. This is why it is a mandatory part of their uniform and must be worn on their lanyard every day.

All you need is a smartphone and the email address and mobile phone number stored on the school system. If you need to change the email address or phone number we have registered, please email **enquiries@noelbakeracademy.co.uk**, and we'll update your records.

Using the School Gateway App to make payments is more convenient and saves the school time and money. It also removes the possibility of students losing cash or spending it elsewhere. You can also view transactions, see what children have been buying and see how much money is on the lunch account.

Getting to the Academy

Before and after school, staff are on duty at the Academy gate to ensure that children arrive and leave safely. Academy expectations apply to students on their way to and from the Academy, and we will follow up on inappropriate behaviour on the way to and from the Academy.

On foot

Please remind your child to take care when crossing roads.

By cycle

Students may cycle to and from the Academy, and we have a transparent cycle shed that is locked during the day. Bicycles must be in good working order, including brakes and lights during the winter months. Students must wear a helmet when with their bike and will only be permitted to collect their bike if in possession of their helmet - this is for their safety. This will be monitored by the Student Leadership Team. Failure to wear a helmet on more than one occasion may result in parents / carers being asked to collect the bike. Students will need to bring a lock to secure their bikes and may only go into the bike shed to leave or collect their bikes.

On the Academy grounds, students must walk their bikes to the bike sheds next to the tennis courts/MUGA. Whilst every effort is made to keep bikes secure, and any students who are caught tampering with bikes will be spoken to, your bike is brought onto the Academy site at the owner's risk.

By car

Parents must not drive onto the Academy site or stop or reverse at the entrance to the driveway at the start or end of the day. This creates additional congestion and endangers students.

By bus

A public bus service (Arriva 1/1A) operates along Bracknell Drive. Students who use the bus service are expected to behave with consideration to others. Any inappropriate behaviour may result in sanctions.







THRIVE

At Noel-Baker Academy, everything we do is underpinned by our belief that all of our students are ENTITLED to the very best breadth and depth of provision.

We are proud of our students and our community and are determined that students will thrive in all areas of their lives, becoming well-rounded, responsible beings who are able to contribute and shape society, whilst respecting and supporting those who live in it.

What is THRIVE?

Thrive is our new character development programme. Character is a set of personal traits that produce specific moral emotions, inform motivation and guide conduct. It is about helping students to become confident, independent and responsible citizens, making informed and responsible choices and decisions throughout their lives.

At NBA, we strive for our students to develop key characteristics within our four core values;

LEAD EMPOWER ACHIEVE DRIVE

Our four CORE values are at the heart of everything we do and run through all elements of the Academy, from our curriculum to our behaviour for learning and rewards policies.

Why is THRIVE important?

- Improves the ability for students to remain motivated by long-term goals.
- Develops positive moral attributes.
- Students develop social confidence and the ability to make points or arguments clearly and constructively.
- An appreciation of the importance of long-term commitments which frame the successful and fulfilled life.



'THRIVE' encompasses a range of objectives that students aim to achieve across the academic year.

Each objective will be worth a number of credits ranging from 5-15.

Students will have the opportunity to log their THRIVE points with their form tutor every half-term.

Students can use most objectives multiple times throughout the year, if successfully achieved by the end of a half-term.

Throughout the academic year students can achieve a range of awards; however, we want all students to aspire to achieve over 525 credits to gain the Platinum Award.



Self-Study

At Noel-Baker self-study is a set of tasks assigned to students by their teachers, to be completed outside the classroom. Self-study is an important part of our retrieval practice strategy and an extension of our schemes of learning, helping students to remember what they have been taught. It also helps to ensure independent working becomes a habit and a key part of our culture at NBA, a skill especially important at KS4 and one linked to high outcomes.



Satchel One is an online platform that we use for the setting and monitoring of homework. All staff will use Satchel One to set homework, all students will use it as a means of accessing set work and all parents will have access to see what work has been set.

What and when?

All self-study tasks are set at the start of the week and students have one week to complete all of their tasks. Students will be set the following self-study tasks throughout the academic year:

- Weekly tasks - English, Maths, Science, History, Geography and Languages Latin and Religious Studies on rotation every fortnight.
- Art/Design and Technology/Drama/Music/Computer Science on rotation throughout the year.
- PE - Weekly goal of attending a co-curricular club.

Satchel One can be used through their website, on a browser, or through their free App which is available on most tablets and smartphones. Some great benefits and features of this system are:

- Can easily see all self-study tasks online.
- The deadline date for the task and any relevant resources which have been uploaded to complete the task are clear and accessible from each student's personal account.
- Self-study is accessible 24/7, and not fully reliant on paper-based work.
- Helps keep organisation of homework.
- Teachers will set Students quizzes online - and see the results once completed.
- Automatic reminders when using the mobile app before and after a deadline.

Noel-Baker House System

Why do we use a House system?

Our vision is that our house system further enhances our pastoral care, allowing our community to foster a more profound sense of belonging and a strong team spirit. The house system will be at the core of every aspect of our ethos and culture and allow all children to excel and contribute based on their strengths. It promotes students' sense of responsibility and creates a positive ethos and culture based on a sense of community and aspiration to be the best.

House membership will bring a sense of belonging and the opportunity to enter into competitions with peers. Educational studies have shown that house systems have numerous academic and social-emotional benefits. Research also shows that those who feel comfortable and supported enough to participate in house events are more likely to feel able to commit themselves fully to academia.

What will the house system be like?

Our House system consists of four Houses linked to our four core values; LEAD, EMPOWER, ACHIEVE and DRIVE. A Head of House will lead each House. Within each House, there will be students from each year group. However, students form groups will remain in year groups.

Students will wear a coloured lanyard, identifying their House colours. All siblings will remain in one House to allow a single point of contact with their designated House Leader.



What are the benefits of using a House system?

The House system:

- Creates a streamlined and more efficient communication system.
- Further enhances the positive school ethos through the participation of House events, competitions and bespoke co-curricular offers.
- Develops school leadership opportunities and peer-on-peer support and guidance, allowing student voices to be coherent across all four Houses.
- Creates a community ethos whereby students across year groups work collaboratively together.
- Further enhances pastoral support for families (SEND, Attendance, MHWB, behaviour and safeguarding).



Attendance and Punctuality

Good attendance is crucial to the future educational success of your child. At Noel-Baker Academy, good attendance is defined as 97% and above, but your child should aim for 100% attendance. If your child achieves this, they will have full access to a knowledge-rich curriculum, the opportunity to engage positively with the academy, and enjoy a feeling of belonging to their community. If your child falls below 97%, they will not be able to fulfil their educational potential.

We know that the main reason your child may be absent from school is due to illness. Keeping healthy, so your child can attend school regularly is an integral part of your child's life. You can help them by ensuring that they exercise, get enough sleep and eat a healthy diet. Please remember that early morning aches and pains often pass, so don't keep your child at home 'just in case' when they could be learning. We will monitor your child's attendance closely and can support your child at school if they are feeling unwell.

Attendance through Illness

If your child is too unwell to attend school, please contact the school before 8.30am to notify us of your child's absence. Please state the reason for the absence and when your child is due back (**Tel 01332 572026**).

For the absence to be authorised, we will require written confirmation explaining the reason for the absence. This can be emailed to **attendance@noelbakeracademy.co.uk** or, upon your child's return school, given to the team in either the Pastoral office for LEAD/EMPOWER on A Floor Green/Yellow or the Pastoral office for ACHIEVE/DRIVE on A Floor Red/Blue. Please contact the school each subsequent day of absence unless a definite return date is known. If you do not contact us within 24 hours of an absence, this will be marked as unauthorised.

Please note that if your child has been sick, they do not need to remain at home for the following 48 hours - they can return earlier!

Medical evidence

If your child has been absent for three days or more with either illness or unauthorised absence over a 6-week rolling period, we will require some form of medical evidence stating the health reasons for the absence. This can also be emailed to attendance@noelbakeracademy.co.uk or given to the attendance office upon your child's return to school.

Medical/dental appointments

Medical/dental appointments must be made outside of the regular school day. Where this is truly unavoidable, the medical appointment card (or letter from parent/carer) should be given to the team in either the Pastoral office for LEAD/EMPOWER on A Floor Green/Yellow or the Pastoral office for ACHIEVE/DRIVE on A Floor Red/Blue.

Holidays in Term Time

We do not authorise any absences for holidays during school time. The Government guidelines are very clear and only allow the Headteacher to grant a leave of absence for exceptional circumstances. You do not have a legal right to take your child out of school for a holiday during term time. Further information is explained in our attendance policy.

All unauthorised absences

If your child is absent from school without authorisation from us, we will have to investigate further with the assistance of the Education Welfare Service. Where it is shown that an unauthorised leave of absence or holiday has been taken, you may be subject to a penalty notice of £60 per parent/ carer per child in the first instance.

Finally, good habits are developed from an early age. Punctuality and attendance must be the norm rather than the exception.

We will always support you to encourage and demonstrate the importance of efficient timekeeping for your child, which will lead them to a bright future!

The Safeguarding Team

When and what might they be concerned about?

Staff or visitors may become concerned about information that suggests a child is at risk. They may observe physical signs, changes in the child's behaviour, pick-up signs of emotional distress or have the child disclose a harmful experience to them.

What they will do if a child discloses that they are being harmed.

1. Listen

They will listen carefully to what the student is saying, trying not to interrupt.

2. Reassure

They will reassure the child that it is not their fault and stress that it was right for them to tell an adult. Throughout the conversation, they will remain calm, attentive and non-judgemental. They will not promise to keep what is said a secret. Additionally, they will ask non-leading questions to clarify, if necessary, such as:

- Tell me more...
- Describe what happened...
- Explain that to me...

E-Safety Guide

This guide is about how to help your child surf the internet safely. We are here to inform, support, and promote good activity whilst going about everyday life in the digital age. Although it is something this generation has been born into, their confidence and skills in using technology are typically high. Still, their knowledge and awareness of the inherent issues, risks and dangers are usually very low. Your child should be able to tell you about their e-safety lessons at school, where they learn to be safe online using a secure network that is as safe as possible.

Child safety on the internet

There is no doubt that new technologies offer tremendous opportunities for children and young people, however, as with any environment, there are also risks.

The kinds of risks range from:

- Cyberbullying
- Grooming
- Identity theft
- Exposure to inappropriate content
- Potential abuse from online predators

SMART advice for your child

Safe

Keep safe by never giving out personal information to people over the internet, such as your full name, address, phone number or photos.

Meeting

Never meet with someone you've met online without your parents' permission and their presence; the person may be lying about who they are.

Accepting

Accepting messages or emails from someone you don't trust or know over the internet can be dangerous; they may contain viruses or bugs!

Reliable

Information on the internet may be false, or someone may be lying about their true identity. Always be careful about what you believe.

Tell

Tell your parents, a carer or a trusted adult if something you've experienced on the internet makes you feel uncomfortable or worried.



Q&A for your children's online safety

Q. What information shouldn't I put online?

Don't give out any personal information online, more specifically: your full parents' banking information.

Q. What is private chat?

This is a private message between you and one or more other people online. It's best to only do this with people you know in real life.

Q. What about social networking sites?

Social networking sites are places where you can keep in touch with friends and let people know what you are doing. You must be careful not to post personal information or photographs, as you don't know who can see them. Usually, you have to be at least 13 to sign up for these social networks.

Q. What if I'm asked to register on a website?

If a website asks you to register online and you have to fill out a form, always ask an adult's permission beforehand.

Q. Is email safe?

Sending and receiving emails between family and friends is usually safe. However, do not open emails from people you don't know or trust, as they may contain viruses.

How to stay safe online

The Internet, mobile phones, social networking and other interactive services have transformed how we live. Children and young people are among the early adopters of new technologies and move effortlessly between the various interactive services and devices to communicate, interact, create and share content with family and friends. They also often use these technologies as part of the school curriculum.



E-Safety Guide: Cyberbullying

Being sent an abusive or threatening text message or seeing nasty comments about yourself on a website can be upsetting. This guide gives you seven important tips to protect yourself and your friends from getting caught up in cyberbullying and advice on how to report it when it does happen.

1) Always respect others

Remember that when you send a message to someone, you cannot see the impact that your words or images may have on the other person. It is important to always show respect to people and be careful what you say online or what images you send. What you think is a joke may hurt someone else. Always ask permission before you take a photo of or create a post about someone.

If you receive a rude or nasty message or picture about someone else, do not forward it. You could be assisting a bully and even be accused of cyberbullying yourself. You could also be breaking the law.

2) Think before you send

It is essential to think before you send any images or texts about yourself or someone else by email or mobile phone or before you post information on a website. Remember that what you send can be made public quickly and stay online forever. Do you want your teacher or future employer to see that photo?

3) Treat your password like your toothbrush

Don't let anyone know your passwords. It is a good idea to change them regularly. Choosing hard-to-guess passwords with symbols or numbers will help stop people from hacking into your account and pretending to be you. Remember only to give your mobile number or personal website address to trusted friends.

4) Block the bully

Most responsible websites and services allow you to block or report someone behaving badly. Please make use of these features; they are there for a reason!

5) Don't retaliate or reply!

Replying to bullying messages, particularly in anger, is just what the bully wants.

6) Save the evidence

Learn how to keep records of offending messages, pictures or online conversations. These will help you demonstrate to others what is happening, and can be used by your school, internet service provider, mobile phone company, or even the police, to investigate cyberbullying.

7) Make sure you tell

You have a right not to be harassed and bullied online.

There are people that can help:

- Tell an adult you trust who can help you report it to the right place, or call a helpline like **ChildLine on 0800 1111** in confidence.
- Tell the provider of the service you have been bullied on (e.g. your mobile phone operator or social network provider). Check their websites to see where to report.
- Tell your school. Your teacher or the anti-bullying coordinator at your school can support you and can discipline the person bullying you.
- Use the **'Worried or concerned'** button on the school website to report an issue that you want school to help with.

Finally, don't just stand there - if you see cyberbullying going on, support the victim and report the bullying. How would you feel if no one stood up for you?

Mental Health and Wellbeing

At Noel-Baker Academy, we promote positive mental health and wellbeing for our whole school community (children, staff, parents and carers) and recognise how important mental health and emotional wellbeing are to our lives, just as physical health.

Our Academy is a safe place where children and young people experience a nurturing and supportive environment. They can build their self-esteem and learn strategies to help them become resilient and overcome adversity.

Our Academy provides students with positive role models and relationships, which are critical in promoting children's wellbeing and can help to engender a sense of belonging and community. We ensure that children can manage times of change and stress to ensure that they are well-supported to reach their potential.

At Noel-Baker Academy, we ensure that children learn what they can do to maintain positive mental health and where they can seek support. We talk about mental health and stigma is challenged by creating a culture of empathy and openness for our staff, students, parents and community.

We hold the Mental Health in Schools Award, which we achieved at the silver level. We are also very proud to have been chosen as a centre of excellence for mental health and, as a result, have a mental health support team as part of the Changing Lives programme based in school.

We have a very clear mental health referral process, and you can feel assured that your child will receive the very best provision, should they need it.

Student Opportunities

Our All Colourz Council and Cultures and Diversity Forum are co-curricular clubs on offer to all students.

The All Colourz Council is a club for LGBTQ+ students and their allies. Students run the group for students. Sessions allow learning about LGBTQ+ history and current discussions that are taking place. It is a safe space to explore and ask questions without judgement. The ACC aims to raise awareness around homophobic, bi-phobic, and transphobic bullying and plans awareness events throughout the year.

Our Culture and Diversity Forum is a group for students who meet with racial diversity and anti-racism in mind. Students share experiences to help shape policy and planning and deliver assemblies and support at open evenings. Inclusion

At Noel-Baker Academy, we work very hard to support our students, including those with special educational needs and/or disabilities (SEND). We work closely with both our partner primary schools and parents/carers to ensure that we have a thorough understanding of the individual needs of our students.

We recognise that transition can be difficult, especially for a child with SEND and their families, so we take extra steps to provide a smooth and purposeful transition process. We believe that all children, including those identified as having special educational needs and/or disabilities, have a common entitlement to a broad and balanced academic and social curriculum, which is accessible to them.

To support students during their journey at Noel-Baker, we offer the following:

Breakfast Club

Every morning, we run a breakfast club from 8:15am until 8:40am in the canteen. Students can join us in activities, chat with somebody from our Inclusion Team, make new friends, or just ensure that they have eaten breakfast to be ready for the day ahead.

The Hub

If students prefer somewhere quieter to go at break and lunchtimes, we run a daily club in The Hub with our Inclusion Team. Here, students can come and play games, read a book, or get to know other students.

Sensory Room

We also have a sensory room: it can really help make you feel calmer when you are having a bad day.

Keyworkers

To support students at Noel-Baker, those identified as needing additional support will be allocated a key worker. They will be there to help you and your child with any of your worries and to offer guidance and support during their time at Noel-Baker.

Interventions

To support students in overcoming barriers, we offer a wide range of interventions to help them achieve their full potential personally, socially, emotionally and academically in all areas of the curriculum.

Student Information Files (SIFs)

SIFs are created for all of our students with SEND and are made readily available for all teaching staff, ensuring a high level of consistent and effective support. They are updated regularly to reflect any changes in students' needs. This provides staff with recommended strategies to support students and meet their needs.
